



The following vegetable plants will be offered in six-packs. Each plant will be grown in its own individual cell for more vigorous roots and plant development. Price is \$2.40 per six-pack until April 1; \$2.85 thereafter. OP = Open-Pollinated; F1 = Hybrid.

**(1000) BROCCOLI, Waltham 29.** 92 days. A mid-to-late season variety with uniform large heads and plentiful side shoots. We have come back to this old good-textured and flavorful variety for summer use and freezing. **OP**

**(1010) BRUSSELS SPROUTS, Oliver.** 90 days. Tall, straight, with abundant tight heads. Nutritious fall crop that also freezes well. Reliable. **F1**



**(1015) CABBAGE, Mixed Flat.** One flat with two plants each of three varieties of cabbage, including: **Tendersweet F1**, a 71-day early summer type with good texture and flavor — our favorite early cabbage for fresh coleslaw and cooking; **Danish Ballhead OP**, 100 days, an excellent late harvest and winter storage cabbage with large flavorful heads; **Red Acre OP**, 74 days, medium-sized heads with good deep purple color, texture, and flavor. These purple cabbages hold up well in the garden and in storage. Order one flat for variety in a small garden, or several flats for increased production.

**(1025) CELERY, Ventura.** 80 days. Tall dark green Utah type. Home-grown celery has far more flavor and texture than the pale store-bought kind. Likes a moist soil. Use fresh and then freeze for winter use. Leaves dry well for use in soups. **OP**

**(1030) EGGPLANT, Ping Tung Long.** 58 days. This is a super-early oriental type (long and thin). Productive, and vigorous plants with a 10"-long fruit. Higher yields when black mulch is used. Very popular because it is early, with sweet flavor. **F1**

**(1035) LETTUCE, Mixed Flat.** A flat of six plants, two of each of the following varieties: **Buttercrunch**, 50 days, a delicious summer bibb type with tightly bunched green compact leaves surrounding compact yellow hearts; **Parris Island Cos**, 68 days, vigorous tall strain of the romaine type, with deep green heads and creamy white hearts for good flavor and texture; **Red Sails**, 50 days, fancy fringed heads of green and burgundy leaves, with pleasing texture and flavor. **OP**

**(1040) PEPPER, New Ace Hybrid.** 60 days. Sweet green bell pepper. Absolutely reliable, with good yields. Sets fruit even in cold weather. Even greater production when grown on a black mulch. **F1**

**(1045) TOMATO, Valley Girl.** 69 days. Maturing fairly early, medium-sized fruit sets reliably in spring conditions. Uniform tasty fruit. Good yields. Our favorite early tomato. **F1**

**(1050) TOMATO, Nepal.** 78 days. Large (10-12 oz.) beefsteak-type bright red fruit. From Himalayan Mountains. Excellent taste even when the weather turns cold. Crack- and disease-resistant. Prolific. **OP**

**(1055) TOMATO, Supersweet 100.** 65 days. An early red cherry with very sweet flavor and high Vitamin C content. Good yields of 1" fruit from strong indeterminate plants. **F1**

**(1060) TOMATO, Heinz 2653.** 68 days. Early Italian paste tomato, especially good for canning. Very dependable variety and our choice for making sauces. **OP**





## VEGETABLES IN POTS



The following vegetables will be offered in individual pots, ready to be hardened off and set into the garden after the last frost. Unless otherwise noted, plants in pots listed below are 75¢ each when ordered by April 1 and 95¢ each thereafter. When ordering, remember that these are individual plants, unless otherwise described.

**(1065) ASPARAGUS, Mary Washington.** An excellent producer (beginning year 3 from seedling). Plants are sturdy, disease resistant. Spears deep green, lightly tipped with purple. **OP**

**(1070) CUCUMBER, Pickler.** 57 days. Early small fruit for salads or pickling. Good yields. Usable in all stages from small sweets to large dills. **F1**



**(1075) CUCUMBER, Marketmore.** 68 days. An early and very reliable slicing cuke. Can be used small as a pickler as well. One of the best quality salad cukes. **OP**

**(1080) CUCUMBER, Oriental Long.** 61 days. High-ridged Chinese long type for salads or pickling. Excellent texture, small seeds, good flavor. **OP**

**(1085) GOURD, Calabash.** 120 days. Very large bulbous body and tapering throat. Spreading vines with handsome leaves. Fruits ripen from green to white and cure to light tan. Dry and use to craft birdhouse, bowl, or other project. Fun to grow. **OP**

**(1086) GOURD, Speckled Swan.** 120 days. Whimsical large 8-14" fruit, dark green with lighter speckling. Long tapered necks and curving bulbous tops give them the appearance of long-necked birds. Dry for crafts as above. **OP**

**(1088) RED KALE, 28-55 days. Red Russian** has deep red curly leaves, filled with vitamins. Use young leaves in salads and stir-fries; more mature leaves as a steamed vegetable or in soups and stews. So you haven't tried it yet? Shame on you. **OP**

**(1090) LEEK.** 100 days. Thick long white stems, dark blue-green leaves. Pot will contain about a dozen small seedlings to be divided and transplanted into the garden. One of our favorite vegetables for soups. Leek, a biennial plant, can be left in the ground over winter. During the second season, plants produce tall showy large round heads. Excellent to cut fresh or to dry. **OP**

**(1095) MUSKMELON, Earliqueen.** 77 days. Large round muskmelon, light netting, deep orange interior. Early, reliable, with very fine flavor. **F1**



**(1100) WATERMELON, Sweet Favorite.** 75 days. Oval green striped fruit, bright red flesh. The best northern watermelon we have found. Matures reliably. Flavor superb. Recommended. **F1**

**(1105-1130) SINGLE PEPPER PLANTS for those who wish fewer than a flat or a few plants of different varieties.**

**(1105) PEPPER, New Ace Hybrid.** 50 days. The most reliable and tasty green sweet bell pepper we have ever grown. **F1**

**(1110) PEPPER, Caliente Chili.** 65 days. Slim tapered long green peppers maturing to bright red, very pungent flavor. Fruits may be dried for use year round. Edible and decorative. **F1**

**(1115) PEPPER, Sweet Banana.** 65 days. Large tapered fruit, thick walls, light yellow color maturing to orange. Excellent texture and flavor for salads or stir-fries. **OP**



**(1125) PEPPER, Jalapeno.** 70 days. A mildly pungent flavorful variety good both for eating fresh and pickling. Good fruit set and easy to grow. **OP**

**(1130) PEPPER, Thai Hot.** 72 days. Tiny red peppers held atop the stems. These extremely hot peppers are excellent for cooking and preserving. **OP**

**(1145) PUMPKIN, Connecticut Field.** 110 days. Popular big pumpkin for jack-o'-lanterns. Bright orange fruits that weigh from 15 to 20 pounds and up. Reliable. Put one on your porch. **OP**

**(1155) SUMMER SQUASH, Yellow Straightneck.** 51 days. Early prolific yellow straightneck. Smooth skin. Reliable. **F1**  
**(1160) SUMMER SQUASH, Zucchini.** 48 days. Long slender medium green fruit. Matures early and produces all summer. **OP**

**(1070-1200) SINGLE TOMATO PLANTS for those who want to grow tomatoes in containers, who want to experiment with one or two varieties, or who have limited garden space.** Some of these are open-pollinated (*heirlooms*) and some are hybrids.

**(1170) TOMATO, Brandywine.** 78 days. The best-tasting tomato we have grown. Heirloom Amish variety, abundant large orange-red fruit. Highly recommended. **OP**

**(1172) TOMATO, Cherokee Purple.** 77 days. Reliable, unusual large eating tomato from Tennessee, possibly originated by Cherokees. **OP**

**(1175) TOMATO, Early Girl.** 65 days. Early and reliable standard determinate eating tomato. **F1**  
**(1180) TOMATO, Sungold.** 52 days. Outstanding indeterminate early golden orange cherry type. Developed in England for superb flavor and yields. One of the best-tasting cherry tomatoes. **F1**  
**(1185) TOMATO, Sweet Million.** 65 days. Long-producing, indeterminate red cherry with very sweet flavor. Large plants, heavy yields. **F1**  
**(1200) TOMATO, Yellow Taxi.** 64 days. One of the best early yellow standard tomatoes, for texture, color, sweet flavor, and low-acidity. **OP**

**(1210) WINTER SQUASH, Buttercup.** 100 days. Dark green flattened cylinder, light green button. Deep orange flesh. Very dry and sweet. Stores well. **OP**

**(1215) WINTER SQUASH, Delicata.** 100 days. Long striped cream-colored fruit with sweet orange flesh. Use fresh or store. Highly recommended. **OP**



## RED RASPBERRIES

*Rubus idaeus*

This excellent variety of raspberry has lived up to its reputation. We can't recommend a better variety for northern growers. Plants are offered as #1 transplants, **three** canes to a pot, ready to be planted in your berry patch.

**Price is \$9.95 per pot or three pots for \$28.50 when ordered by April 1; \$12.50 per pot thereafter.**

**(1220) BOYNE, Red Raspberries.** An early-season variety that is extremely winter-hardy. Medium to large fruit with outstanding flavor and firm texture. Be certain to plant enough canes so that you will have berries to eat fresh, to make jams, and to freeze for winter desserts.



## BLUEBERRIES

*Vaccinium corymbosum*

After considerable research, we have chosen what we consider to be some of the best highbush blueberry varieties for growers in this area. Each variety is a reliable producer of quality berries. If you are starting a blueberry garden, it is **best to have two varieties of berries for pollination.** Space plants 3-4' apart in rows 8-10' apart. Two-year-old blueberry plants will be in one-gallon pots. **Price is \$10.95 per plant or three plants for \$32.25 if ordered by April 1; \$12.50 per plant thereafter.**



**(1230) BLUE RAY.** A very reliable mid-season plant with large tight clusters of berries. Extremely winter-hardy and reliable. Excellent yields.  
**(1235) PATRIOT.** This super-hardy variety was developed in Maine. It is a vigorous grower with flavorful large berries that are early to mature. Space as above, for pollination and production.

## GRAPES

*Vitis sp.*

Two-year-old plants of the varieties described below will perform well in average garden soils with adequate moisture. They fruit best when located in full sun, supported by trellises for air circulation, and pruned yearly. Vines are especially productive and graceful when trained over a fence or an arbor. Each plant, a two-year-old #1 specimen, will be in a large nursery pot ready to be planted in the garden.

**(1245) CONCORD GRAPE.** This is the variety that surrounds our original rectangular arbor located to the left of the entrance. In only a few years, the plants matured into a beautiful bower. Its six vines have grown into vigorous plants that now yield several bushels of fruit each season. The fruit is produced in large clusters of blue-black seeded flavorful grapes. Fruit is good to eat fresh or to use in making jelly or juice.

**(1252) EDELWEISS GRAPE.** This excellent pale green grape is being offered for growers who would like an exceptionally hardy green variety. **Edelweiss** is rated for zone 3 and will winter over with temperatures as low as 30 below zero. It is one of the hardiest light-colored grapes available. The fruit clusters are smaller than Concords. Medium-sized grapes are usually harvested from late August into September, a bit earlier than Concords. Flavor is excellent for eating fresh, for making juice, and for making wine.



### KIWI FRUIT

*Actinidia arguta*

Kiwi is a beautiful hardy fruiting vine. It grows best in areas where it is protected from harsher spring or fall exposures. Plant on a sheltered south slope.

Female and male vines are needed to produce fruit. One male can pollinate up to eight surrounding females. Use a trellis for support. Space vines 10' x 10'. Egg-shaped, smooth-skinned fruit does not need to be peeled before eating or processing. Plants will be #1 transplants. **\$14.95 per plant or three for \$41.85 until April 1; 16.95 each thereafter.**

## ELDERBERRY

*Sambucus canadensis*

American Elderberries, beautiful 6-10' ornamental shrubs, are handsome in the home landscape. They are insect- and disease-free and require only average soils. The plants produce clusters of delicate white flowers in early summer, followed by deep purple berry clusters. Elderberries make delicious jellies and homemade wine. Plants are hardy, easy to grow, and can be pruned. 12-18" plants. **Price is \$10.50 each or three plants for \$29.00 until April 1; \$12.50 each thereafter.**

## AMERICAN Highbush CRANBERRY

*Viburnum trilobum*

This lovely shrub is both an ornamental and a productive fruiting variety. Plants grow easily in average garden soil in full to partial sun. They mature to a height of 8 to 12'. Bright white flower clusters, appearing in spring, are followed by pendulous scarlet fruit in midsummer. The three-lobed foliage changes from deep green to a burnished red in the fall. Berries are used for delicious jellies and conserves. 12-18" plants. **Price is \$12.50 per plant or three plants for \$35.25 until April 1; plants will be \$14.50 each thereafter.**
